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The Lenten Theme

This Lent, we are focusing on the life and faith of one of Jesus' disciples, Peter. In Peter, we see a person who is both steadfast and unsteady, a friend and a betrayer, a follower and a wanderer. As we read the faith journey of Peter, we often see ourselves. Peter has a wandering heart. His journey is not polished, or linear, or perfect, but he is always tethered to the love of God. In this series, we want to affirm that faith is a constant journey of steadfast pursuit, one that ebbs and flows. We want to affirm the ways Peter keeps going: He drops his nets, he walks on water, he runs to the empty tomb, he swims to the shore to meet the risen Christ. He keeps searching and yearning and loving, even after missteps or mistakes. Ultimately, in Peter's story, we are reminded that God loves imperfect people...just like us. *Please stand in body or in spirit.

Lenten Crosses

LATIN CROSS: Most common of all crosses. This symbolizes the supreme sacrifices offered by Jesus on the cross for all humanity. Also emphasizes New Testament teachings.

ST. GILBERT CROSS: The St. Gilbert/Portate Cross. From the day he was born, St. Gilbert suffered from a deformed spine. He became a priest at the age of 40 and ministered among the poor. Another name for the St. Gilbert Cross is the Portate Cross. Portate is from the Latin portare 'to carry.' Thus, reminding us of the cross carried by Jesus prior to his Crucifixion.



CALVARY CROSS – the three steps leading up to this graded Latin cross represent the hill of Calvary. In addition, God's three gifts of faith, hope and love.



ANCHOR CROSS: This is used to symbolize the Christian's hope, which is anchored in Christ. Also known as the mariner's cross. It is a life saver. It serves as a navigation through the journey of faith.



CELTIC CROSS: ancient Celtic culture highly influenced by art. The circle represents eternity or the circle of community.



JERUSALEM CROSS: Christ's command to spread the gospel to the four corners of the earth. Also represents the four gospel writers with Christ in the center.

GREEK CROSS: Usually suggests the Christian church rather than a symbol of Christ's suffering. It appears as a 'plus sign' in liturgical documents to indicate where the priest should make the Sign of the Cross. Another and equally famous variation of the Greek cross is the emblem of the Red Cross. More than one hundred years ago, the International Red Cross was founded to aid those wounded in battle. The objective of the Red Cross emblem was to have a unified distinctive sign that would be respected internationally.

TAU CROSS: The tau is the sign used by St. Francis to wish peace to all he met. It looks like a T. In the Old Testament, it is the last letter of the Hebrew alphabet. For Christians, the T came to represent the cross of Christ as being the fulfillment of the Old Testament. Today, followers of St. Francis - laity or religious - wear the tau cross as an exterior sign, a seal of their own commitment to exemplify God's love and continue the ministry of Christ.
